> DEDICATION OF 1972 CONVENTION ISSUE OF NEWSBOY

This issue of NEWSBOY is dedicated to Forrest Campbell, for it was the opinion of the Board of Directors at Mt. Pleasant, Michigan, the 1972 Convention site, that Forrest, in his eleven years in the Society, has unselfishly dedicated himself in furthering the Horatio Alger Society and in preserving the memory of Alger himself. One of the co-founders of the Society, Forrest was editor of the NEWSBOY from 1962-1969, as well as author of two Alger-type works a book, THE YOUNG POSTMASTER, serialized in NEWSBOY from 1963-1965, and a play, THE BOY FROM THE BOWERY, written and produced in 1967.

Those who know Forrest Campbell remember him for his warmness to all who profess an interest in Alger and respect him for his thorough knowledge of Horatio and his books. For these and other innumerable reasons, the 1972 Luck and Pluck award was given to him in absentia at Mt. Pleasant — in honor of his unswerving loyalty to Horatio Alger Jr. — and to the Society that bears his name.

The highlight of the day by far was the smorgasbord that Doris Bennett prepared for us that evening. With a wide variety of dishes and climaxed with two different kinds of cake, all there proclaimed it to be even <u>better</u> than excellent, and more than one person went back for 2nd, 3rd, and even 4th helpings of everything.

After dinner, we all gathered in the Bennett's living room to "talk about Alger," with Ralph Gardner acting as moderator. The subject of the discussion was in regards to the "title and price list" that the Society printed, and whether we should condone the practice of placing prices on Alger books. 



The Horatio Alger Society Scrapbook was on display at the Bennett's home, and all who paged through it remarked how interesting it was. I've now started on Volume II, with Volume I containing approximately 225 pages.

We were all at the Clarke Historical Library the next day, and John Cumming of Central Michigan University talked to us about the library and its rare book room. Also, Bob Bennett had on display a number of his first edition Algers, including RAGGED DICK, SEEKING HIS FORTUNE, and GRAND'THER BALDWIN'S THANKS-GIVING...

The annual banquet took place that evening at the Holiday Inn, and the winners of the LUCK & PLUCK and NEWSBOY awards were announced. Forrest Campbell was the recipient of the LUCK & PLUCK award in recognition of his steadfast devotion to Horatio Alger and the Society, and Ralph D. Gardner received the NEWSBOY award in honor of his latest book, ROAD TO SUCCESS, a bibliography of Alger's works, published by Wayside Press of Mendota, Illinois.

New officers of the Society were elected, and those chosen were Bob Bennett as President and Jack Bales as Vice President, with Carl Hartmann and Dan Fuller retaining their respective offices of Executive Secretary and Treasurer. A new policy was begun by the Board of Directors which states that after each President's term of office is over, he will then serve as Director. Therefore, we now have four Directors: Ken Butler, Ralph Gardner, Forrest Campbell, and Judson Berry.

Of course, an HAS Convention would not be complete without one of Ralph's contests, so after dinner Ralph distributed this year's test. In my opinion, it was his hardest yet (write to me if you desire a copy of it), but one of our newer members, Evelyn Grebel, who wrote the excellent article, "Our Hero's Mother" for the last issue of NEWS-BOY, received one of the highest scores.

We also had professional entertainment on the program with Dan Fuller, an English professor at Kent State University, performing some magic tricks for our benefit. Dan, who is affectionately known as "that Alger nut" by the students at Kent State, presented a program that was extremely enjoyable to everybody. Professor Henderson of BOUND TO RISE fame would have been proud of him!!!

After the banquet, the book selling session began in Bob's basement, with over twenty people happily comparing, bartering, bargaining, selling, and trading their respective books. Though I cannot recall all the different arrays that were present, I remember Sharon and Keith Barnes bringing many Algers to sell. Also, Judson Berry brought a few dozen books from the "Berry Antique Den" in Sioux Falls, S. D. Carl Thieme impressed everybody with the fine quality of all of the books that he had for sale and Milton Salls owned four copies of Mayes' biography that he wished to sell. Dale Thomas got a first of THE WESTERN BOY and a Munsey copy of A FANCY OF HERS, thus improving his already fine collection.

The 1972 Convention ended with the farewell breakfast the next day, where we all signed a Holiday Inn postcard, printed a big "HI" on it, and sent it off to Charles Bragin. Before departing, numerous promises of "See you next year," and "I wouldn't miss the next one for anything," were made by those in attendance. So . . . all I can do is echo the sentiments of Bob Bennett as expressed in this month's President's Column and urge everyone to get together in Indianapolis next

After the minutes of the previous convention were read, the report of the Membership was given. As of May, 1972, we have 168 members and 9 Library members, a steady increase since last May when we had 153 members with 8 Libraries.

Dan Fuller read the Treasurer's report. In income we have a balance forwarded from May 11, 1971 of \$86.45. This plus cash from dues, donations, Dan the Newsboy pictures, Title and Price Lists, frames, patches, and other miscellaneous items amounted to \$1319.15. Subtract from this \$1125.92, which is the total amount of the expenditures that the Society incurs, including the cost of the NEWSBOY, Wayside Press, bank charges, and the State of Illinois. Therefore, we are in the black \$193.23, which is our balance as of May 10, 1972. (By the way, please remember that all donations to the Society are tax deductible).

A proposal by George Clarke was read concerning the Jr. Alger Club which now has 20 members. However, it was decided that the idea would not be feasible at this time and it was therefore defeated.

It was mentioned that new membership cards have been printed up, and that any member who does not have one may obtain a card by writing Carl Hartmann.

The next year's convention was brought up, and it was announced that Paul House will host the 1973 convention at Indianapolis, Indiana on May 11-12-13. Please remember, however, that the Board of Directors welcomes any suggestions for the 1974 Convention site.

With that the meeting was adjourned.
