2014 convention report

'Adrift in Annapolis'

A bright, sunny and 75-degree Thursday afternoon greeted members of the Horatio Alger Society as they arrived from around the country to attend the 50th annual H.A.S. convention, "Adrift in Annapolis," held the weekend May 1-4 in the capital city of Maryland.

Convention host Richard B. Hoffman (PF-570) had selected the perfect hotel, the modern Hampton Inn & Suites just off U.S. Route 50 and a short drive from the 18th-century historic district of Annapolis, located on the Severn River. Hoffman met several of the early arrivals, including President Barry Schoenborn and Ed Mattson (PF-067), who were busy in the parking lot, unloading many boxes of books for the following day's auction.

The refreshment-filled hospitality suite, as well as the conference room (both conveniently located on the first floor) were open in time to unload the books and get them organized and set up on display tables. In addition to the Frank Jaques (PF-654) estate collection and other books from Mattson's vehicle, Jack Bales arrived from Virginia with the consignment books of Bill Russell (PF-549), totaling just over 100 items. By the time all the books were catalogued on Executive Director Bob Sipes' computer (including items brought to the convention by members), nearly 300 individual and combined lots were spread out on some dozen tables encircling the conference room.

The "so happy to see you after a year" greetings continued as familiar faces, along with several first-time attendees, checked into the hotel and picked up their convention packets, name tags and souvenir (an insulated travel mug printed with "Adrift in Annapolis"). The conference room proved to be an ideal gathering place because it was located a few steps from the lobby, and there were plenty of chairs, along with the auction books already on display. The hotel also kept hot coffee and hot water for tea available in that room, as well as in the lobby. When we needed several extra tables to accommodate the large number of auction books, the hotel happily provided them within minutes.

The only official business usually held on Thursday is the traditional Board of Directors meeting, which was held in the conference room. President Barry Schoenborn called the meeting to order at 4:30 p.m., and it ran for 90 minutes (see Executive Director Bob Sipes' detailed report

on the directors' meeting on Pages 6-7). The remainder of Thursday afternoon and evening was spent socializing and enjoying dinner on our own.

Friday, May 2

The hotel provided a free (hot or cold choice) continental breakfast, with plenty of seating in the lounge area, and everybody took advantage. Again, the breakfast area was located a mere 10 feet from the conference room, a great convenience, so by 8:30 a.m., most of us had enjoyed our morning coffee and continued to meet and greet, along with a chance to more closely examine the auction books.

At 9 a.m., convention host Dick Hoffman made his formal greeting, explaining a few details about the schedule, including the Friday and Saturday night restaurants, car-pooling arrangements, and an exact head count for (*Continued on Page 5*)

Editor's notebook.

Another convention — our 50th — is in the books, and what better place to hold it than Annapolis, Maryland, one of America's most historic cities — in fact, an early transitional seat of our national government.

Dick Hoffman organized an excellent program, highlighted by our walking tour on Saturday afternoon of the United States Naval Academy under warm and sunny conditions. Our group was treated to a more comprehensive tour than normal, lasting two hours instead of the usual hour and a quarter. Our guide, David Hanner, was friendly and extremely knowledgeable, and he answered our many questions.

We were able to walk through the interior of several buildings on the Academy grounds, including Bancroft Hall, one of the world's largest college dormitories; the historic drill hall; and the modern athletic facility with its Olympic-sized swimming and diving pool, wrestling practice facility and displays honoring the Army-Navy football series and Heisman Trophy winners Roger Staubach and Joe Bellino.

We were unable to see the interior of the historic chapel because of ongoing traditional Saturday weddings of Midshipmen, but we did visit the ornate crypt below the chapel which holds the remains of the "Father of the American Navy," John Paul Jones.

If you are ever in the Annapolis-Washington-Baltimore area, a visit to the Naval Academy is a must. Tours open to the public can be arranged through the visitors' center, which also houses a wonderful gift shop.

Dick Hoffman's restaurant choices were also first-rate: Mike's Crab House on the scenic South River on Friday and the Galway Bay Irish Pub, located just steps from the historic Maryland State House, the site of our annual banquet on Saturday night.

Chase's latest: The convention also featured the introduction of Brad Chase's latest reference book, *Small Horatio Alger Books Published by Thomas D. Hurst.* Per tradition, Brad personally inscribed copies sold to fellow Alger enthusiasts. My review of the book is on Page 16, and Brad's advertisement, which includes a special offer of \$45 for both his books on Hurst, is on page 20. This brings to 17 the number of publishers covered in Chase's seven books on Horatio Alger formats, a project that took more than 30 years.

the Saturday afternoon walking tour of the U.S. Naval Academy. That accomplished, he turned the meeting over to President Barry Schoenborn, who noted this was his final convention as president, thanking the members in attendance for their support. Schoenborn then introduced the morning's presentations.

Ed Mattson, one of the Society's longest-tenured members (his PF number of 067 is third-lowest on the list), gave a full demonstration on how to clean and care for books, showing the materials he regularly uses in his bookselling business. He had examples of typically soiled and "shaken" cloth- and leather-bound books, and showed how they can be brought back to life with proper patience and care. Ed brought a supply of chemicals and other cleaning materials to sell to members at cost.

Brad Chase followed with the formal introduction of his new book, *Small Horatio Alger Books Published by Thomas D. Hurst*, using PowerPoint Slides to show various cover designs for the small books, incorrectly labeled for decades as "Hurst miniatures." Bob Eastlack brought a small shelf filled with small Hursts for Chase to use with his presentation.

Bill Gowen followed with the latest in his series of audio-visual presentations about lesser-known authors of juvenile books. His talk was titled "Jack Bechdolt and The Barrow Brothers Series," and it covered not only that boys' series, but the wide selection of other books Bechdolt wrote over the first half of the 20th century, including a large number of picture books for young people illustrated by his wife, Decie Merwin.

Following the presentations there was a 15-minute break, with the morning program resuming with the annual H.A.S. business meeting. The main item on the agenda was the nomination of candidates and election of officers and directors. The slate approved the previous day by the Board of Directors was nominated and elected by voice vote, with no nominations from the floor. Elected President was Jeff Looney (PF-903), with the new Vice President Dick Hoffman (PF-570), and the three directors elected to 3-year terms through 2017 Marlena Bremseth, Joseph Strang and James King. Because Hoffman is leaving as director to become vice president, outgoing director Robert Petitto volunteered (and was elected) to fill out the remainder of Hoffman's term.

The other major new business was the site for the 2015 convention, and Bob Huber, who hosted the very successful 2011 get-together in Canton, Ohio, agreed to do it again, this time selecting the Ohio state capital of Columbus, most likely to be held the weekend of

April 30-May 3, 2015. Ohio State University's graduation ceremony is the following weekend.

The business meeting was immediately followed by a lunch buffet in the hotel's guest lounge.

Shortly after 12:30 p.m., all members returned to the conference room for the annual consignment and donation auction, which included the Alger collections of Bill Russell (PF-549) of Hatboro, Pennsylvania, and the late Frank H. Jaques (PF-654) of Ada, Oklahoma. Also, there were approximately 100 lots donated or consigned by several members, plus a "bonus" donation of Alger books from a non-member from Atlanta, Georgia.

A complete summary of the 2014 H.A.S. consignment and fund-raising auction is on Pages 10-14.

Following the nearly four-hour auction, everybody took a break to freshen up for Friday night's dinner at Mike's Crab House, a waterfront restaurant just a few minutes' drive via car pools from the Hampton Inn. Most Partic'lar Friends and their guests enjoyed the huge servings of Maryland crab cakes. Because of the ambient noise level of the restaurant, the annual Alger quiz was postponed until Saturday night's banquet.

Upon our return to the hotel, the hospitality room remained open until late in the evening.

Saturday, May 3

The annual H.A.S. book sale began at 9 a.m. following another excellent free breakfast in the hotel guests' lounge. The conference room was open early to allow time to set up, with Ed Mattson and Bob Huber leading the way with large offerings of Algers and other series books, many of the latter in dust jackets.

The sale lasted until about 11 a.m., which allowed us to have lunch on our own until leaving by vans to the U.S. Naval Academy. The 1 p.m. walking tour was led by a very knowledgeable guide, David Hanner. Our group visited several key buildings on the grounds, including Bancroft Hall, the huge dormitory housing the entire Brigade of Midshipmen, which also includes Memorial Hall on the second level honoring our Navy heroes of the past.

Visits inside Naval Academy Chapel are closed on Saturdays when Midshipmen's weddings are scheduled, but we were able to enter the decorative marble crypt in the chapel's lower level, holding the remains of the legendary John Paul Jones.

At 5:30 p.m, we went via car pools to the Galway Bay Irish Pub, just down the street from the Maryland State House, to hold our our annual awards banquet.

Following an excellent dinner, we held the annual Horatio Alger quiz, and the winner was the evening's keynote speaker, Peter Walther (PF-548).

The major banquet event each year is the presentation (*Continued on Page 19*)

Barry Schoenborn, President, called the meeting to order at 4:30 p.m. No old issues were noted.

Chris DeHaan, Treasurer, presented the annual financial report. Gross income for the previous 12 months was \$8536.08 and expenses were \$8,069.94, resulting in a net gain of \$466.14 for the fiscal year ending April 30, 2014. The gain was attributed to increased auction proceeds of \$4,139.00. Total cash on hand includes \$5,604.61 in checking deposits and \$8,990.60 in a certificate of deposit for a total of \$14,595.21. No funds were received by the Treasurer from the PayPal Giving Fund (previously known as Mission Fish) from eBay auctions. All PayPal Giving Fund monies are earmarked for the Strive & Succeed Award fund. The net gain of \$466.14 breaks four consecutive years of small losses and is due in no small part to Milton Ehlert (PF-702), who donated his fine collection of dust-jacketed Alger books to the H.A.S. 2013 auction. It was decided not to raise dues but to concentrate on increasing membership, promote the Sustaining membership option and to continue soliciting high quality auction material for future conventions.

The regular Strive & Succeed Award fund income for the previous 12 months totaled \$1,095.00, and the amount in the account is \$1,109.46 due to a small excess from last year. The board voted to award \$1,000 to the recipient selected by the convention host. It was noted that there were no Strive & Succeed donations made online.

Robert Sipes, Executive Director, reported total membership at 135. This includes 101 Regular members, 13 Sustaining members, seven Life, five Honorary and nine Libraries. There were five new members added during the previous 12 months and seven drops for a net loss of two members. This compares unfavorably to the previous 12-month period when we had a net gain of two members. Of the seven lost members, one was due to death and the rest were undetermined. Most of the new members

during this past year were recruited through relationships with existing members. One member renewed his membership online (via PayPal). There were no Strive & Succeed Award donations made online. While we have continued to lose members; our overall membership has remained relatively stable (see chart, above).

Robert Sipes also reviewed our online social media presence. The H.A.S. Facebook page is slowly growing in membership. However, due to low level of membership activity on the page, our overall reach is very limited. We currently have 99 Facebook members that have liked the H.A.S. page and receive updates. Many of these Facebook members are not H.A.S. members. The level of activity on the H.A.S. page is very low; however, when a member posts some content, there is a small level of activity implying that increased content would result in increased activity.

Robert Sipes also provided a status regarding the H.A.S. repository, which remains robust. Northern Illinois University added a handful of titles and continues to provide scans and other reproductions to H.A.S. members upon request. The endowment is stable with a balance as of March 31 of \$45,790.37. There is \$612.56 left expendable for FY 14 following payout for the FY 13 fellowship. The projected FY 15 expendable is \$1,748.43.

Last year's fellowship was awarded to Timothy Hendrickson for his project titled "Still Adventurous: Genre Shifts, Narrative Experiments, and the Legacy of the Late-Victorian Adventure Story." Applications are currently being solicited for this year's fellowship.

The Nominating Committee Report was presented by Barry Schoenborn. The nominees were as follows: for President is Jeff Looney, Vice-President is Richard Hoffman, Treasurer is Barry Schoenborn and three directors are Marlena Bremseth, Joseph Strang and James King. The directors will serve three-year terms. Richard Hoffman's move to Vice-President leaves a one-year gap to complete his term as director. Robert Petitto graciously nominated himself to fill the one-year gap.

Robert Huber, Director and consistent convention attendee, volunteered to host the H.A.S. 2014 convention in Columbus, Ohio. Preliminary research into hotel locations and activities looks very favorable. The costs should be comparable to recent conventions. While the dates are yet to be confirmed, it is highly likely that the

convention will take place the weekend of April 30-May 3. This venue was approved unanimously by all in attendance and later during the business meeting was enthusiastically accepted by the membership.

Robert Huber, H.A.S. Webmaster, reported that a considerable number of past issues of **Newsboy** are now available for viewing on the H.A.S. website. Robert East-lack, Director, also discussed his work in scanning a large number of older past issues of **Newsboy** for inclusion on the H.A.S. website, along with his work in indexing **Newsboy**. Additional discussion ensued regarding add-ing content related to other authors to boost visitors to the site and potentially increase membership. President-elect Jeff Looney commented that this would be a priority focus during his tenure as President. All in attendance agreed with many volunteering support.

The **Newsboy** Report was given by William R. Gowen, Editor. The print run for **Newsboy** is currently 160 issues and will remain the same. The total annual expense for producing **Newsboy** has remained relatively stable during the past decade. print run based on membership to balance the increase in postage and printing costs. Total cost per issue increased from \$3.74 to \$4.21 for the previous 12 months. This was primarily due to preprinting color mastheads and printing an additional color issue. Two color issues were printed during the past year and at least one color issue is contemplated during the next 12 months. A brisk discussion ensued regarding raising dues slightly for print editions of **Newsboy** and offering digital only subscriptions at the current price, which would be delivered via e-mail in PDF format. It was decided that dues will remain the same at this time, but that further discussion and activities would take place during the upcoming year.

An honorarium of \$100 each to the Executive Director and **Newsboy** editor was approved.

President Schoenborn adjourned the meeting at 6 p.m.


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





BOOK REVIEW

It's hard to believe that Brad Chase's journey in describing various Horatio Alger publisher formats began more than three decades ago. His first book, *Horatio Alger Books Published by A.L. Burt*, came out in 1983. I bought my copy at my first convention, "Collected in Columbus," held that spring.


Now, Chase has published what he insists is "my final book," a comprehensive description of the 11 different formats in the books we called for many years "Hurst miniatures." Of course, as he explained in his article in the recent March-April 2014 **Newsboy**, those books are not miniatures at all. They were published in the *16mo*. size, whereas true miniature books are much smaller. So, Brad decided to change the working title for his latest book, calling the finished publication *Small Horatio Alger Books Published by Thomas D. Hurst*.

This book is a companion volume to his *Thomas D*. *Hurst and his Publication of Horatio Alger Books*, released in 2012. That book described the 30 different cover formats of Hurst's full-sized Algers, known as *12mo*, the common size of typical series books issued by the majority of publishers.

So, Chase's 31-year journey into researching the formats of Algers includes 17 publishers. He felt the basic early Alger publishers, including A.K. Loring and its immediate successors Porter & Coates, Henry T. Coates and John Winston, along with the Penn Publishing Co., had been covered in detail by other researchers, whose findings were published over the years in **Newsboy**.

The only major "outlier" remaining was Hurst, and Chase felt that publisher was too difficult to track down, until former H.A.S. president Bob Routhier convinced him at the 2008 convention in Carson City, Nevada, that the two of them should have a go at the complex Hurst puzzle. Brad agreed, but unfortunately, Routhier passed away shortly thereafter and the project was stalled.

Chase decided to continue on his own, with help from his son Scott, a fellow H.A.S. member as well as expert in genealogy, who was able to track down Hurst family members living overseas. They were most generous in providing information about Thomas D. Hurst, born



in 1843 in England, who moved to New York City to establish his publishing firm.

The Hurst personal and corporate chronology is covered in detail in Chase's 2012 book; in the current volume, he gives a condensed background on Hurst and his publishing firm. He then goes into describing the 11 small Hurst formats. The new book matches the 2012 volume: it is 9x5½ inches, bound in cloth with a color dust jacket. The book's layout and d/j design were accomplished through the computer expertise of Jim Towey (PF-975), a Connecticut neighbor.

At 152 pages, *Small Horatio Alger Books Published by Thomas D. Hurst* is shorter in length than the 2012 book's 242 pages because of the more limited subject matter. The quality is the same, with up-to-date book cover scans replacing the detailed, expertly-drawn tracings used by Chase in the 1980s and 1990s.

This highly recommended book discusses the small Hursts in great detail, with 131 illustrations of covers and dust jackets (the latter when known). The cost is just \$23, including shipping. If you buy both books on the Hurst Algers, Chase has a special price of \$45 (see advertisement on the back page of this issue).



This writer decided a followup was in order. He went to NIU and inventoried the Alger Repository to ascertain which, if any, titles were donated and which were still needed. Much to his dismay he learned that all 46 titles are still needed and that Format 33 (previously deemed complete) was missing two titles, bringing the actual list to 48.

of the **Strive and Succeed Award**. The 2014 recipient, introduced by host Richard Hoffman, is Sandrita Borckhardt, a senior at Bullis School in Potomac, Maryland.

Sandrita's parents immigrated from Peru in the mid-1990s following terrorists' threats to the family. Her father told her: "We did not leave Peru for us, Sandrita. We did it for you and your brother, so that you two could have a stable and secure life and best education possible. Your future is what motivated us to come here."

Sandrita is a highly motivated student leader at her school and has been involved in numerous activities. Outside of school, she worked as a camp volunteer at the Treatment Learning Center (TLC), an organization that works with special needs children aged 4 to 8.

That experience led to Sandrita's desire to eventually become a pediatrician, so she will follow that path in college. She has been accepted to start her studies this fall at the University of Maryland, which has awarded her its Banneker/Key Scholarship. Sandrita's parents, Juan and Sandra Borckhardt, joined her at the banquet.

Following the **Strive and Succeed Award** ceremony, the annual H.A.S. awards were presented, as follows:

• The **Dick Seddon Award** was presented by 2013 recipient Ann Chase to Betsy and Lee Allen (PF-977) of Stone Mountain, Georgia, frequent convention attendees, who regretfully were unable to attend this year.

• The **Carl Hartmann Luck and Pluck Award** was given to Wendy and Bob Sipes (PF-1967), as hosts of the highly successful 2013 convention, "Race to Indy."

• In his final act as outgoing president, Barry Schoenborn presented the **President's Award** to Chris DeHaan (PF-773), who is retiring as H.A.S. treasurer after an amazing run of 16 years doing one of the most underappreciated jobs in the Horatio Alger Society.

President Jeff Looney introduced Silver Spring, Md., resident Michael Dirda, a 1993 Pulitzer Prize recipient while a book critic/reviewer for **The Washington Post**. Dirda is now working on a book tentatively titled *The Great Age of Storytelling*, in which he wants to include Alger among the most influential writers of the late 19th-early 20th centuries. Dirda received from Looney a copy of *Ragged Dick*, along with an H.A.S. membership plaque, since he is now an honorary member.

Our keynote speaker, Peter Walther, offered a wideranging talk titled "Horatio Alger, Jr. and William T. Adams [Oliver Optic], a Professional Relationship, with some further inferences on the Brewster Affair."

Early in his presentation, Walther offered the following

premise: "Since Horatio Alger and Oliver Optic were the literary giants of their time catering to the male juvenile market and often residing in the same state, what can we advance on a personal level regarding them? They were certainly aware of each other's reputation, yet did they ever meet? Did they ever seek each other out socially or did they befriend each other in any way? Unfortunately, we have no direct documentation to prove 'aye' or 'nay,' yet various primary and secondary sources exist to offer some suggestive scenarios."


The presentation went on with some of those scenarios, including the two authors' professional involvement with **Student and Schoolmate** and its publisher, Joseph H. Allen. "We have all heard of the three B's of music: Bach, Beethoven and Brahms. Why not the 'three A's' here: Adams, Alger and Allen?," Walther asks.

For Partic'lar Friends not at the banquet, Walther has generously offered this presentation to be published in **Newsboy** as a two-parter, maybe by the end of the year.

The banquet concluded, we all headed back to the Hampton Inn & Suites, where the hospitality room again remained open until the late hours.
